





SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION


Confessions are heard on Saturdays from 4–4:30 p.m. or by appointment.

Thoughts On Pilgrimage

As I write, Matt Browne and Father Ed Sheridan are together on a pilgrimage to the World Youth Day gathering in Poland. One of the things I will miss about having Matt around is reminiscing with him about the very special pilgrimage we took together last summer to the Holy Land with a group of seminarians. Daily, he had photos sent to his phone somehow (too high-tech for me) of the two of us and fellow pilgrims at various sites exactly one year ago to the day.

To be honest, at first I turned down the offer of the pilgrimage generously financed by the Knights of the Holy Sepulcher. Did I really need to go on a pilgrimage? After all, don't I have access to Jesus right here on Long Island? What is the purpose of a pilgrimage, anyway? Would God hear me better from Israel than from America? No, not at all. Nor is a pilgrimage a form of magic whereby the pilgrim controls God, forcing God's hand to grant the pilgrim's requests by visiting certain sites. A pilgrimage does not change God. A pilgrimage changes the pilgrim.

The above observations about pilgrimage are not my original thoughts. The priest traveling with us preached them in his homily early in the trip. Those homiletic talking points sounded good, but would this land really change me? Really affect me? What did I see around me in this Holy Land? Littered streets, military checkpoints, vendors hawking their wares, people coping with extreme summer heat – what was holy about any of this?

Thus my first realization – this pilgrimage was no museum tour. It was here in these places that Jesus moved about in His own day through littered streets, possibly through military checkpoints, maybe waving away assertive vendors, in the blazing desert sun, in a land stressed by religious and political tension. In that messy, “earthy” land, would I feel the presence of Christ?

In this short column, there is not

enough space to talk about all the places in Israel that struck me in a special way, so I will mention only three – three places that were very different from each other.

I swam in the Sea of Galilee. How cool is that? It was sort of an afterthought on the part of our guide. As we returned to our guesthouse one afternoon, he mentioned to us that there was a nice beach nearby where we could swim if we wanted. A number of us thought this sounded like a good idea, and we changed into our bathing suits and made our way to the “nice” beach according to our guide's directions. When we got there, we wondered if our guide had ever actually seen a nice beach. There was no sand, but plenty of mud. Trash cans were overflowing. Raggedly dressed children wandered around. Some people had an illegal campfire going. I avoided the mud by navigating a route over treacherous boulders above and below the water's surface. But then I was swimming in the Sea of Galilee! It was on these waters that Jesus walked. In this large lake, the Apostles fished. It was into these waters that Peter jumped when he recognized the resurrected Christ on the shore – into these waters. I swam there.

The town of Magdala is an active archaeological dig site. It was discovered accidentally in 2006. It is strongly believed to be the town of Jesus' friend Mary. There is a very modern church there now. The foundations of ancient shops and houses have been uncovered. For me, the most striking thing about Magdala is the synagogue. Yes, that's right. They've uncovered the floor of the synagogue, and remaining parts of the walls, too. As I walked around it, I considered how likely it was that Jesus would have entered this very synagogue. I don't know if Jesus had ever stood at that exact muddy and rocky spot where my fellow pilgrims and I entered the Sea of Galilee, but it was highly likely that he had come here to Magdala, to this synagogue. Was I walking now where God the Son walked? Walking where

God *physically* walked? I almost feel as if this spot is too holy for me to be there. I feel a sudden pang of pity. Imagine those poor people of Magdala who never knew who this man was who sat in this synagogue and walked in these streets, who walked where they walked.

The Holy Sepulcher? Come on. Really? How can I know that this is it? Our knowledgeable guide was quick to point out when certain places were probably not really the sites of the events they were alleged to be, but this site, he believed, was really where (or very close to where) the tomb of Jesus was located. The Church of the Holy Sepulcher is huge and encompasses the purported site of the Crucifixion. Six of us from my group went together one night to pray there. We were locked in around 9 p.m. with a number of others who had come to do the same. The doors were unlocked about midnight to allow in Greek Orthodox worshippers who were participating in a special midnight ceremony. During those three hours, the church was free of crowds. In one section of this great church, there is a small building, like a little house. When you enter, you are in a small anteroom. A small doorway at the back leads to the site of the tomb. There is room for about three people to kneel there. This place is not a museum. It is sacred space. That night I knelt at the site of the Resurrection of Our Lord. Writing this, I hesitate over the keyboard trying to find the words to tell you about that, but I am afraid my writing skills fail to meet this challenge. I leave it to you. That night I knelt at the site of the Resurrection of Our Lord. Imagine that.

I walked where Jesus walked. “Big deal,” some may say. “God is everywhere, and He's not in Israel any more than He is right here in America.” True, but a pilgrimage changes the pilgrim. *Seeking* to walk in the steps of Jesus and *feeling* His presence around me are what this pilgrimage was about. I think that maybe, if one does a pilgrimage right, the pilgrimage lasts a lifetime.



Dear St. Rosalie's Parish,

As some of you may already know, my time at St. Rosalie's has now come to an end. I'm currently in Poland with Father Ed for World Youth Day along with Pope Francis and about two million other young people who have gathered with us to give praise to our God. Please keep all of us in your prayers and be assured of our prayers for you!

I would like to take this opportunity to express my deepest gratitude to you all. Not every seminarian has the opportunity to be assigned to such a vibrant and life-giving parish like St. Rosalie's. Although it feels like I just arrived yesterday, I think back on all the different experiences I've had, the formation I've received, and the friends I've made over these past ten weeks. I cannot thank you enough for your warm welcome, for your prayers, and for all of your support throughout this time spent at St. Rosalie's.

You are all so blessed with an incredible pastor. Father Ed has been such an amazing teacher to me over these weeks. He's a teacher in a different sense though. Rather than lecturing me and telling me how I should do things, he lives and breathes priesthood. Every single day during this assignment I have witnessed Father Ed embrace his priesthood in everything that he does in any way possible at any hour of the day or night. Thank you, Father Ed for being an awesome priest and mentor to me over this time and thank you for giving your life over to the Lord and his people as a priest. Thank you also to Father Collins, Father Kevin, Father Steve, and Matthew Prochilo. Thank you for your witnesses as well. You have all been a great source of encouragement to me throughout this time. One day you too will be terrific pastors like Father Ed.

The Sulpicians, who are the priests that make up the formation team at Theological College, the seminary that I attend, often describe seminary as the time between the Ascension of Christ and the descent of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost – a time in which the apostles were afraid and looking for direction and preparing themselves to go and build up the Church that the Lord began. Seminary is that time in which we prepare ourselves to go out by growing in our prayer and in our studies so that we can serve the people of God in the best way possible. However, at times, seminary formation can have some challenges and it can be easy to forget what being in the seminary is all about. This summer assignment at St. Rosalie's has reminded me that the seminary is not the end but only the beginning to something that's so much greater. Being here has been a reminder to me that the priesthood is truly, as St. John Vianney reminds us, "the love of the heart of Jesus." If we think about what that statement really means and reflect on how Jesus lived his life, we come to the conclusion that the priesthood is the love of God and his people in any and every way possible. It has been through that love that has brought me so much joy in my life, but especially over my time here at St. Rosalie's.

Thank you for reminding me what the priesthood is all about. Thanks for your love and for kindness to me. My time here has been an experience that I will never forget. I apologize if I've ever offended anyone here by not remembering your name, even though you introduced yourself to me over five times, or by anything that I've said or done.



A partir de las reflexiones sinodales no queda un estereotipo de la familia ideal, sino un interpelante «collage» formado por tantas realidades diferentes, colmadas de gozos, dramas y sueños. Las realidades que nos preocupan son desafíos. No caigamos en la trampa de desgastarnos en lamentos autodefensivos, en lugar de despertar una creatividad misionera. En todas las situaciones, «la Iglesia siente la necesidad de decir una palabra de verdad y de esperanza [...] Los grandes valores del matrimonio y de la familia cristiana corresponden a la búsqueda que impregna la existencia humana». Si constatamos muchas dificultades, ellas son —como dijeron los Obispos de Colombia— un llamado a «liberar en nosotros las energías de la esperanza traduciéndolas en sueños proféticos, acciones transformadoras e imaginación de la caridad». *De Amoris Laetitia*, §§55,57.
