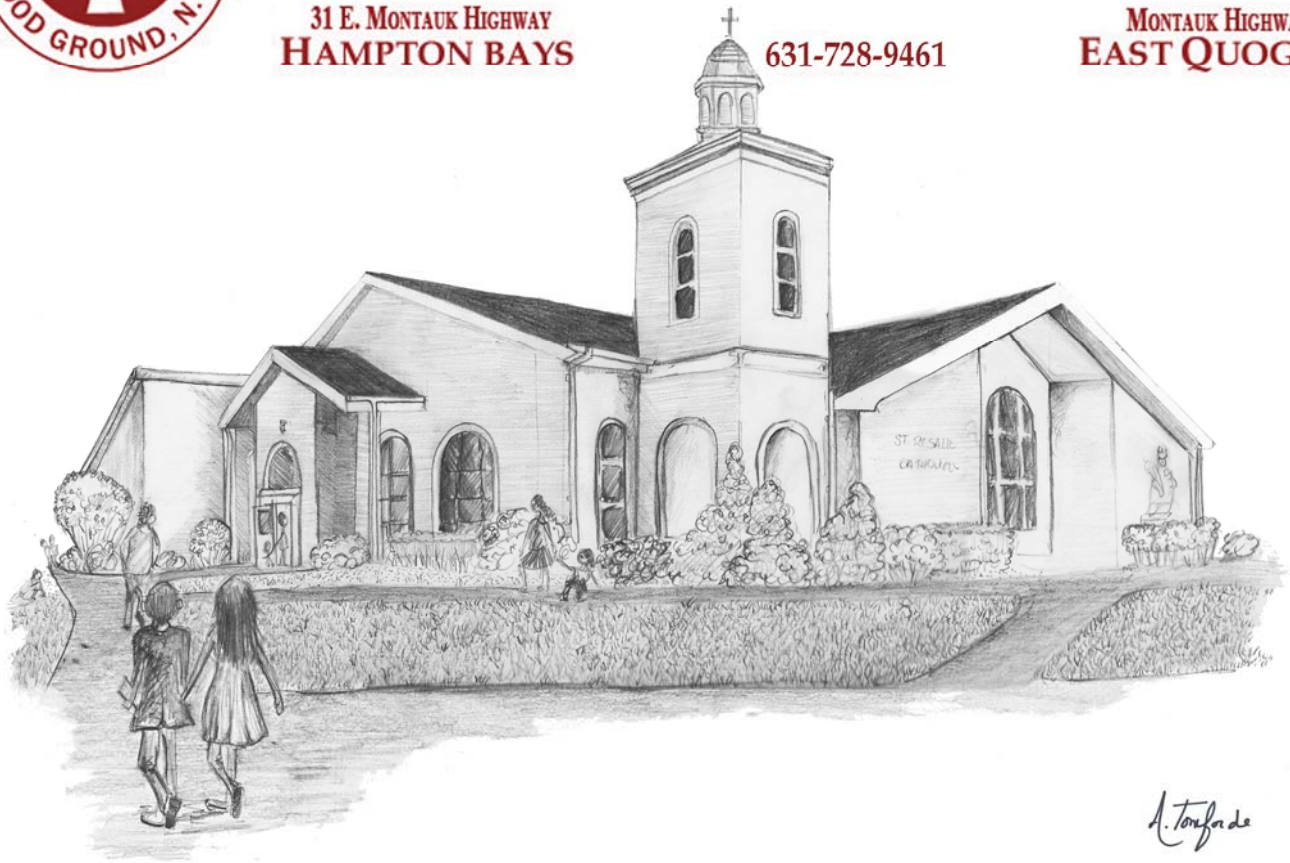

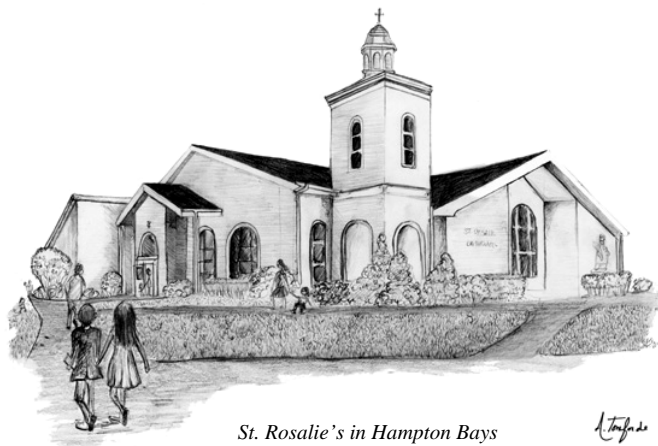

### SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION

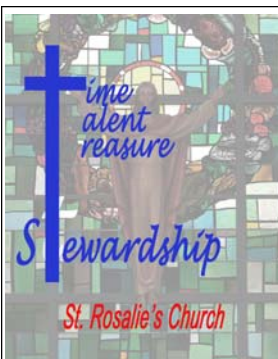
Confessions are heard on Saturdays from 4 - 4:30 p.m. or by appointment.

# Further Thoughts On Pilgrimage

“Embodied spirits” -- that’s a term that comes up in theological talk about the nature of humans. We are not angels (who are pure spirit) and not beasts (without souls). To be human necessarily means to have both body and soul. The Resurrection of Christ and the Assumption of Mary, as well as the eventual resurrection of our own bodies, highlight the essentialness of the body-soul connection to our humanness. Often, when we think about ourselves as religious persons, we think primarily about the state of our souls – and that’s good! Our primary concern in this life should be the salvation of our souls and the souls of our brothers and sisters. So what about our bodies? What role does our physicality play in helping us come closer to God?

First of all, the physical and the spiritual are often closely linked. We express love by cherishing pieces of jewelry or other items which belonged to our loved ones or were handed down in our families – relics, really. We are sentimentally connected to certain places which remind us of people and events.

In many ways, Catholicism is a very physical faith tradition, isn’t it? Think about it. We are not shy about embracing our physicality in our worship. Beads, incense, music, and art speak to our senses of touch, smell, hearing and sight. Even our sense of taste is employed as we weekly take the Body and Blood of Jesus into our own bodies. As physical creatures of God, we want to come into physical contact with the Holy. On my pilgrimage in Israel I was struck by a statue of Our Lady of Grace, all white except for the hands which were worn black by the hands of countless pilgrims. Why? What good is there in touching a lifeless statue? Perhaps only this: anything which brings us closer to God is worth doing.

The ring on my right hand is worth more than the gold of which it is made because it was my grandfather’s. Of course, the ring is *not* my grandfather,

but, in some way, it connects me to him. Similarly, the statue is not Mary, nor is Mary God. Inspired by so many who had done so before, I reached up to touch the hand of the statue. I reached to Mary, and through her to God.

Recently, in a previous column, I reflected on my experiences being in the actual places where Jesus physically was. Along the way on that pilgrimage, however, we stopped at a number of places whose connections to certain events were uncertain, sometimes unlikely. Were those places worth visiting?

I look at it this way: we really don’t know, for example, when Jesus was born. Sometimes non-Christians (anti-Christians) may derisively point out that Christmas is observed on December 25 to replace a pagan holiday. So what? We Christians believe in the importance of the Incarnation. We don’t know when Jesus was born, but we know he was born. If we were to discover with certainty that he was born on a different date, we would likely move our Christmas feast, but until then, we’ll keep it where it is. Why? Because we believe it is important to acknowledge the event, so we do the best we can.

I feel much the same about the locations in the Holy Land where we are doing the best we can to acknowledge events worth acknowledging. At the Church of the Nativity, there is a star on the floor inside something like a small grotto. It honors the spot on which Jesus was born. A few feet away, pilgrims honor the spot where the manger stood. To be frank, I am not at all convinced that these exact locations are accurate. Someone asked me afterwards if I thought it was possible that the Holy Spirit had guided the decision to designate those locations. Admittedly, I hadn’t thought of that before, so, yes, I will say that it is possible. I will also say that, regardless of whether or not the star on the floor is accurately placed, I know that just as

the birthday of Jesus is worth celebrating, the birthplace of Jesus is worth visiting. To travel to that site is a form of physical prayer. Getting down on one’s knees to reach into the grotto to touch or kiss the star is to make a physical and spiritual connection to a long-ago event and to the person of Jesus Christ.

There were other sites whose authenticity we cannot verify. Our group visited a site dedicated to the “Our Father.” I do not know exactly where Jesus taught his disciples to pray those words, but my fellow pilgrims and I traveled to this site, stood together, and prayed that prayer. There is a beautiful garden which pays tribute to the appearance of angels to poor shepherds to announce the birth of Our Savior – a place to stand in the quiet open space and contemplate the awe and hope such an announcement would have brought. The Church of the Visitation recalls Mary’s visit to Elizabeth, and the art there invites the pilgrim to contemplate moments in the life of Our Lady.

Angels have no need of relics, statues or jewelry of sentimental value. They have no need of the church calendar or pilgrimages to earthly holy places. God chose to create them as wholly spirit. God did not choose that for us. In the words of the old movie title, “We’re No Angels.”

So is a pilgrimage worth it? Even to sites whose authenticity cannot be confirmed? Yes, because we exist in time and space. That is what God chose for us. As I indicated in my previous column, there is a thrill to be physically where Jesus Christ was. I wish we knew exactly where every event recounted in the Gospels actually took place. Maybe in the next life we will, but then I wonder if it will matter. How much will my grandfather’s ring matter when I can touch his hand? How much will we need a pilgrimage when we can stand in the presence of Christ? Until then, we do the best we can.

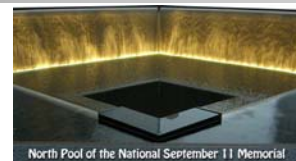

## Adult Education

Do you want to learn more about your faith? You can at St. Rosalie's this Fall. St. Rosalie's has started an Adult Education program on Wednesday evenings beginning in October. This class is open to all adults who would like to learn more about church teachings, Sacred Scripture, and Catholic traditions as well as deepen their faith.

We will begin with a survey course in scripture. This is a great course for current and or future Catechists or anyone else that feels God calling them to a closer relationship with his Word. All our instructors have an MA degree in Theology and are eager to share their faith.

Course Title and Textbook: *Understanding the Scriptures*

This book is written by Dr. Scott Hahn and it presents a Catholic approach to Scripture, highlighting the theme of covenant. Tracing a path through salvation history, the book explains the various books of the Bible and the importance of each event in salvation history. *Understanding the Scriptures* will provide an understanding of Sacred Scripture so critical to the Catholic Faith.

The textbook, is one of four in the Didache Complete Course Series, it is used to teach theology by high schools, parish bible studies and in RCIA formation, and it is also suitable for anyone looking to broaden their faith knowledge.

## Holy Hour

In addition to the regularly scheduled Wednesday Adoration, on the fourth Thursday of the month we will celebrate Eucharistic Exposition and Benediction commonly referred to as Holy Hour from 6 to 7:30 p.m.

The USCCB no longer considers Holy Hour as a devotion, but rather as a part of the Church's official liturgy. In the past, Benediction was frequently added to the end of another service or devotion. This practice is no longer permitted. Eucharistic Exposition and Benediction is a complete liturgical service in its own right and is to be celebrated as such taken from "Holy Communion and Worship of the Eucharist Outside of Mass, which is a part of the Roman Ritual" and Order for Solemn Exposition of the Holy Eucharist, number 7.

In the light of these directives, the Order for Solemn Exposition of the Holy Eucharist provides several settings for the Liturgy of the Hours and two Eucharistic Services of Prayer and Praise. These liturgies are designed to "acknowledge Christ's marvelous presence in the sacrament and invites us to the spiritual union with him that culminates in sacramental communion." Our Holy Hour will include the praying of Solemn Vespers, the Rosary and the Divine Mercy Chaplet with sufficient quiet time to contemplate our Lord Jesus Christ.
